A meeting of the Water Committee of the Salt River Project Agricultural Improvement and Power District (the District) convened at 9:30 a.m. on Tuesday, October 21, 2025, from the Hoopes Board Conference Room at the SRP Administration Building, 1500 North Mill Avenue, Tempe, Arizona. This meeting was conducted in-person and via teleconference in compliance with open meeting law guidelines. The District and Salt River Valley Water Users' Association (the Association) are collectively known as SRP.

Chair P. Rovey called the meeting to order.

Consent Agenda

Chair P. Rovey requested a motion for Committee approval of the Consent Agenda, in its entirety.

On a motion duly made by Board Member M. Pace and seconded by Board Member L. Williams, the Committee unanimously approved and adopted the following item on the Consent Agenda:

Canyon Lake Drawdown Project

Using a PowerPoint presentation, Craig Larson, SRP Senior Director of Power Generation, stated that the purpose of the presentation was to provide information regarding the Canyon Lake drawdown project, which includes SRP lowering the water level in Canyon Lake in the Fall of 2026 as part of routine maintenance and 20-year cycle inspections by SRP and the Bureau of Reclamation of normally submerged infrastructure at Horse Mesa and Mormon Flat Dams, both components of the Salt River Federal Reclamation Project.

C. Larson provided an overview of the project and explained the reasoning for lowering the lake level. C. Larson provided an overview of SRP's coordination, communication, and outreach with external stakeholders related to the project beginning in April of 2024.

C. Larson noted SRP's recent communications regarding the project on various platforms such as the SRP and project websites, media coverage, and social media. They discussed water operations and presented images depicting the size of Canyon Lake during the drawdown process.

C. Larson provided a breakdown of work to be completed at the Mormon Flat Dam and Horse Mesa Dam and discussed channel work and restrictions downstream of Horse Mesa Dam. C. Larson presented images from 2007 of the Horse Mesa Plunge Pool and Fish Creek Delta. They concluded with a review of areas impacted by the project.

C. Larson and Ivan Insua, SRP Director of Hydro Generation, responded to questions from the Committee.

Copies of the PowerPoint slides used in this presentation are on file in the Corporate Secretary's Office and, by reference, made a part of these minutes.

Council Liaison S. Naylor left the meeting during the presentation. Board Member S. Kennedy entered the meeting during the presentation.

Report on Current Events by the General Manager and Chief Executive Officer or Designees

Jim Pratt, SRP General Manager and Chief Executive Officer, reported on a variety of federal, state, and local topics of interest to the Committee. They introduced McKell Purnell as the new SRP Associate General Manager and Chief Human Resources Executive.

Aggregate total of **240,283 acres** of forest thinned — an **increase of 45,719 acres** from FY24.

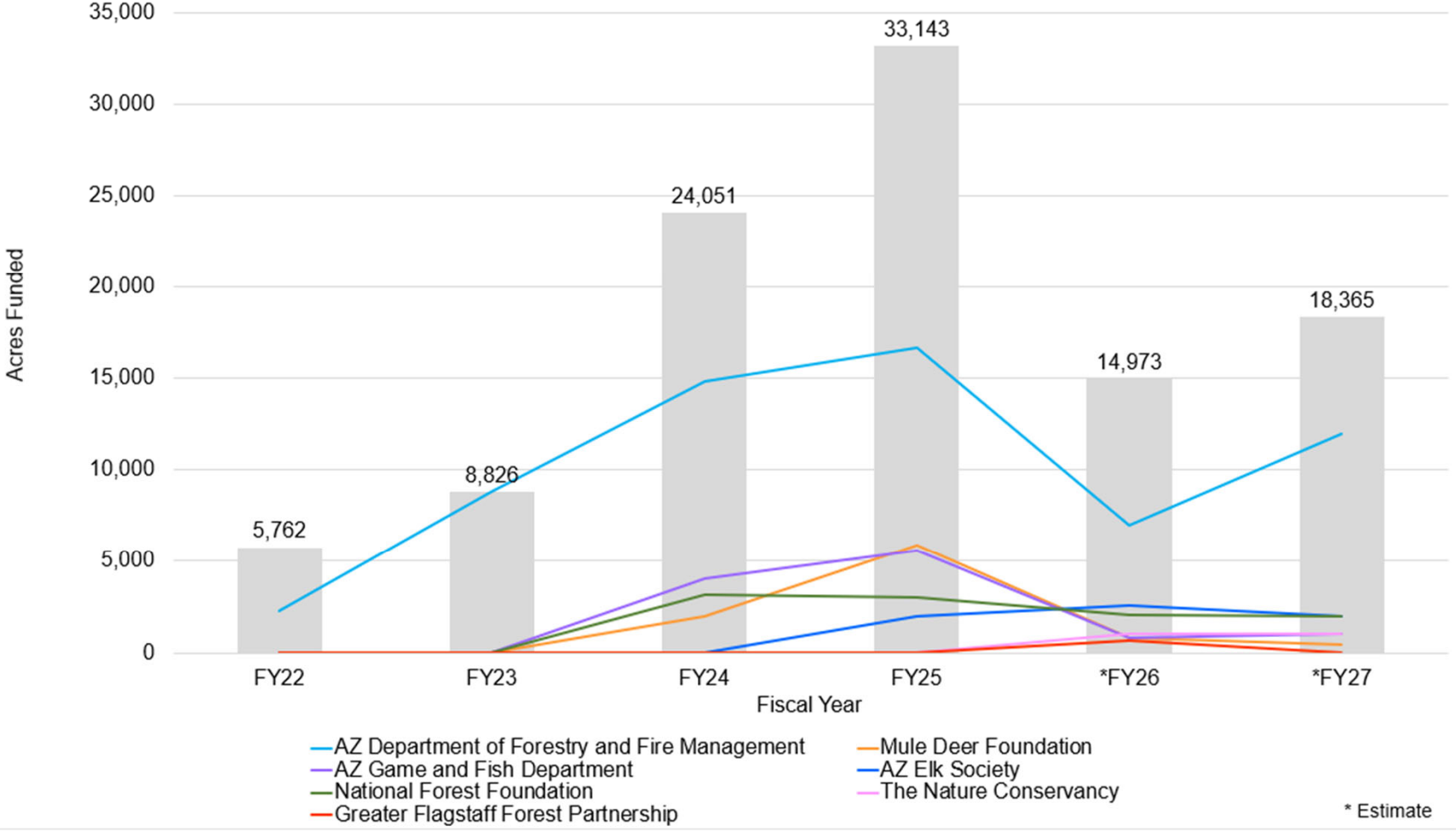
FY25 Accomplishments

- Partner Funding: ~\$6.7M

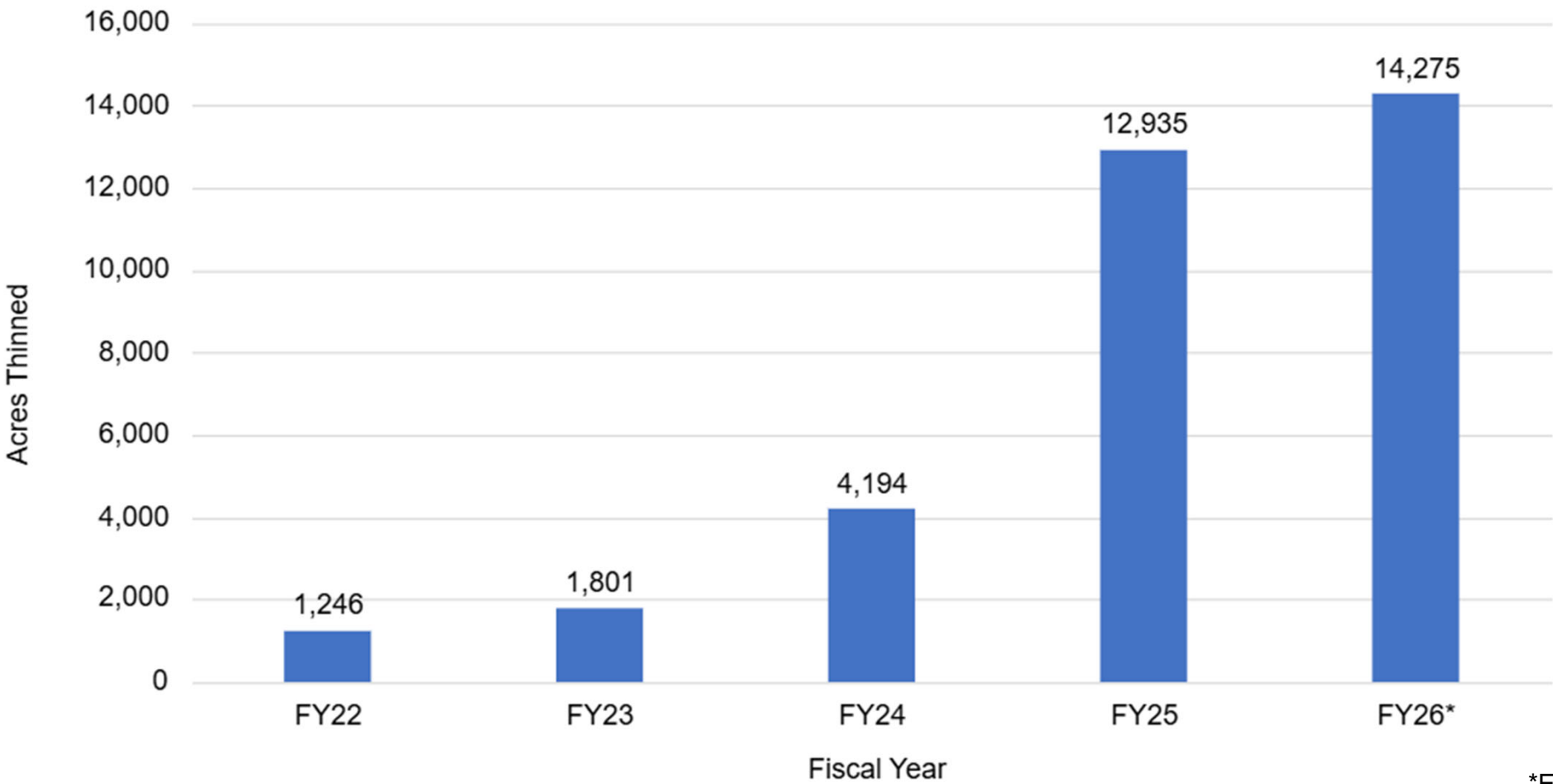

Forest Health Accomplishments: Funded Acres



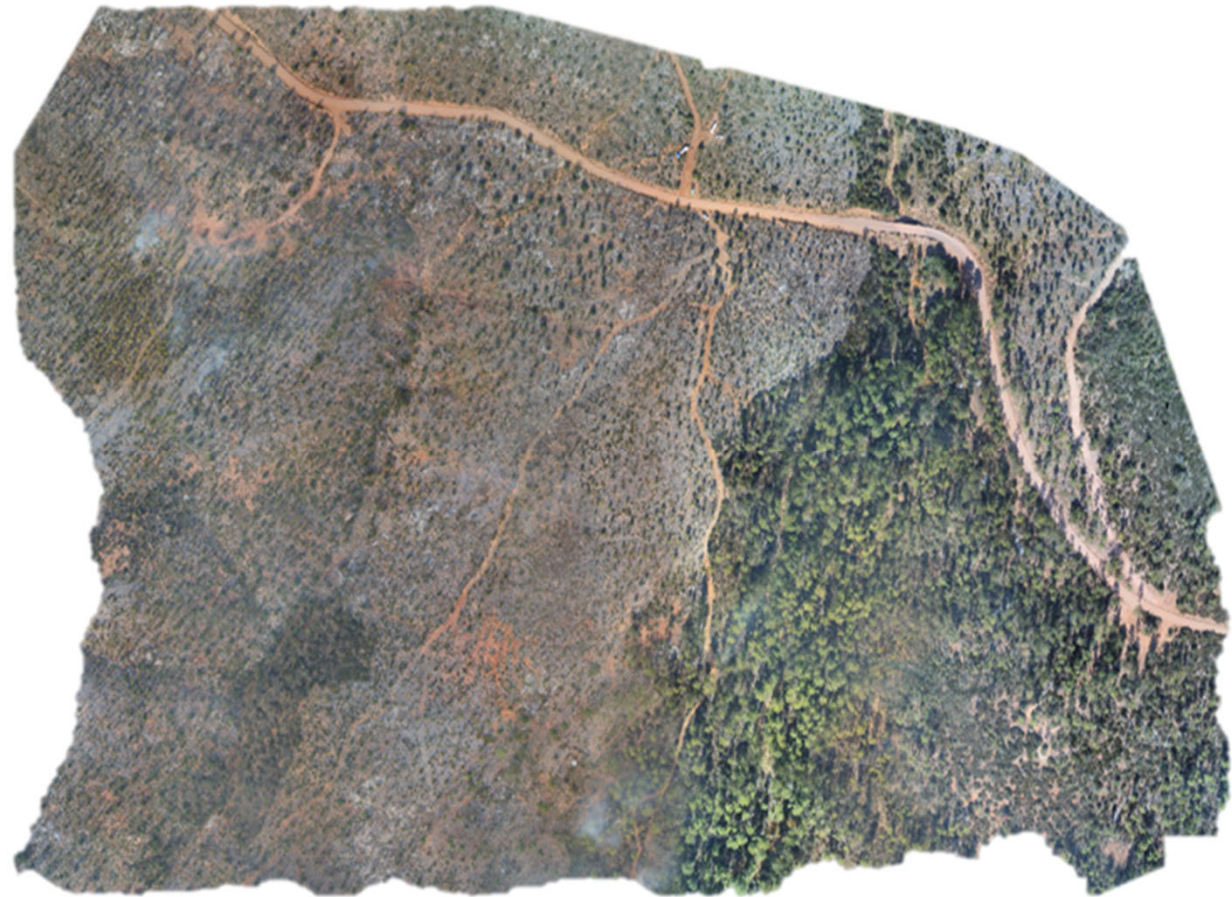
Forest Health Accomplishments: Completed Acres

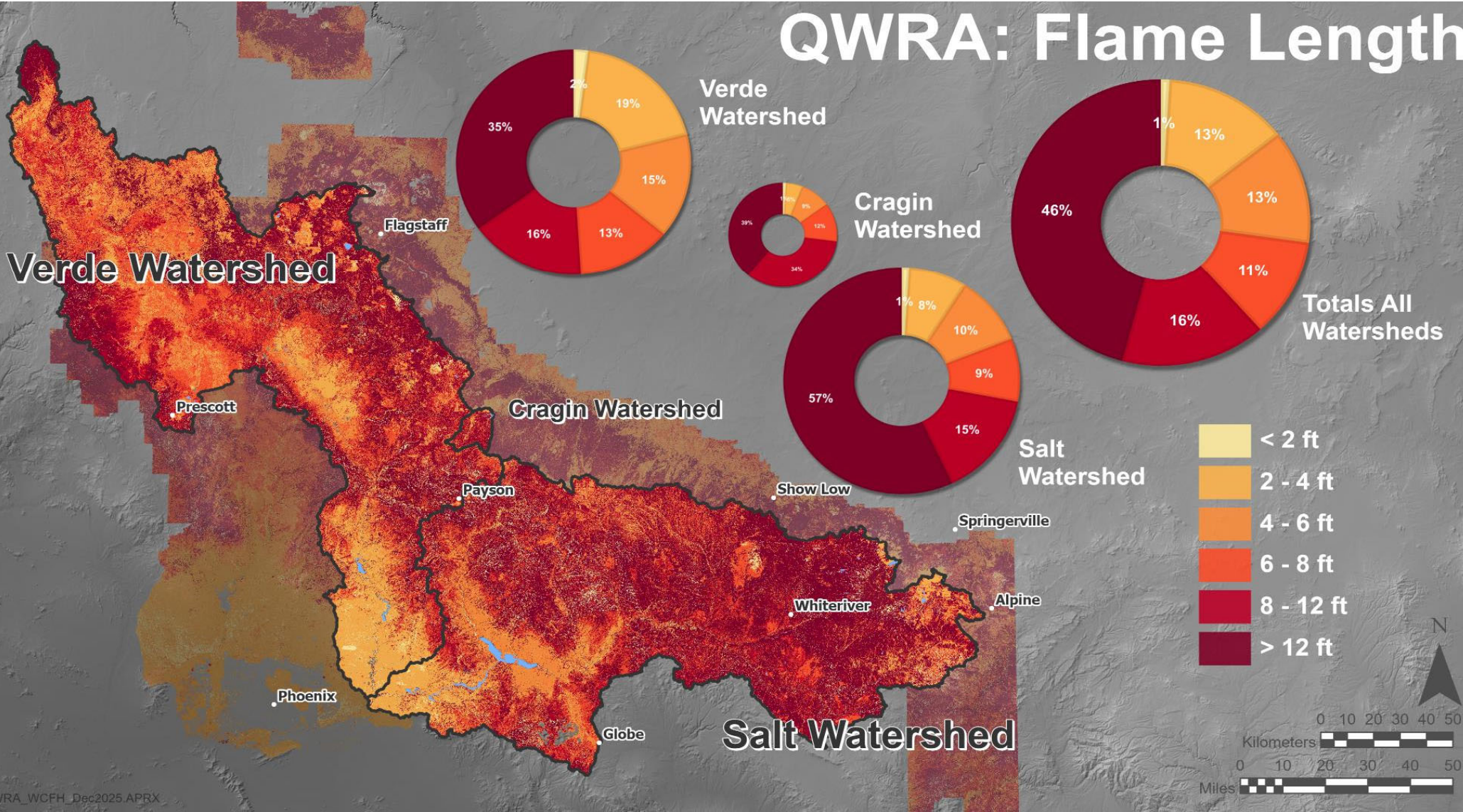

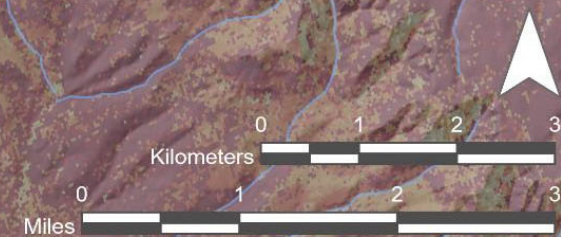

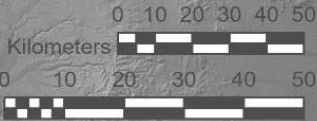

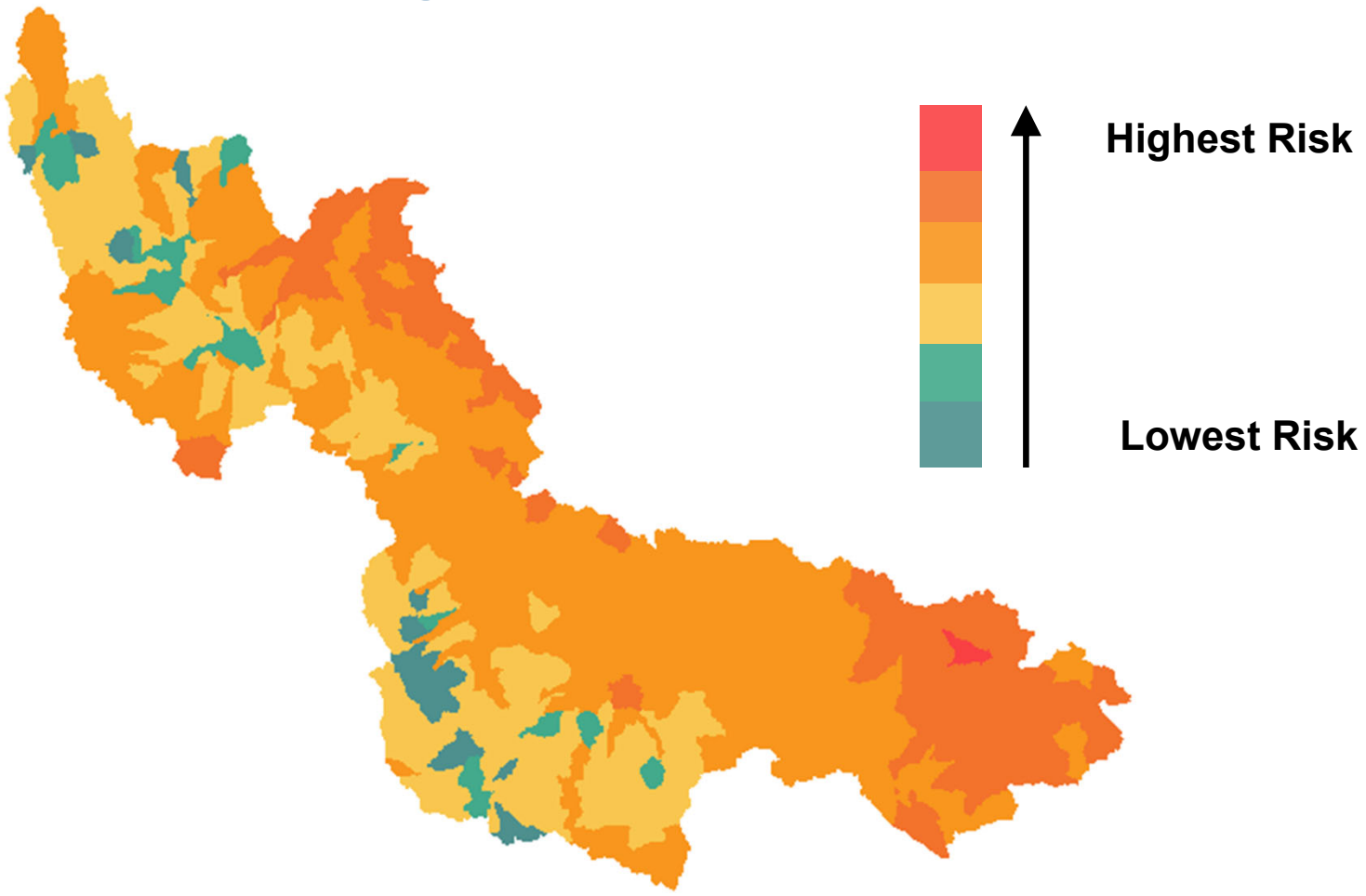

Biochar Update

Biochar is created from biomass that is heated in the presence of low oxygen.

- Industry research and conversations identified two main biomass issues
 - Biomass feedstock supply chain
 - Biomass end uses
- SRP proposed solution to support biochar creation from forest biomass
- RFI Issued in November 2024
- RFP issued in October 2025

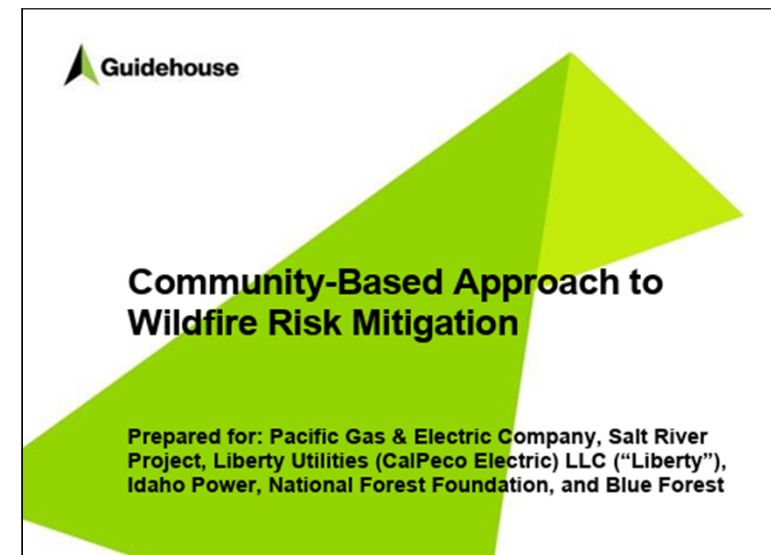
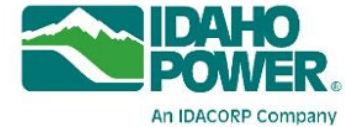

Forest Health Workgroups

- Wildfire Resilience Utility Workgroup
 - August 2024: Workgroup created
 - July 2025: Guidehouse whitepaper
 - Workgroup presented at 4 conferences and webinars in 2025
- Western Watershed and Wildfire Resiliency Workgroup
 - October 2025: Awarded \$90,000 from Innovative Finance for National Forests Grant
 - Goal: Provide expert mentorship and support to western water utilities that demonstrate a desire to scale their watershed and wildfire resiliency efforts. Attract larger-scale investors wanting to achieve Colorado River Basin-wide benefits.

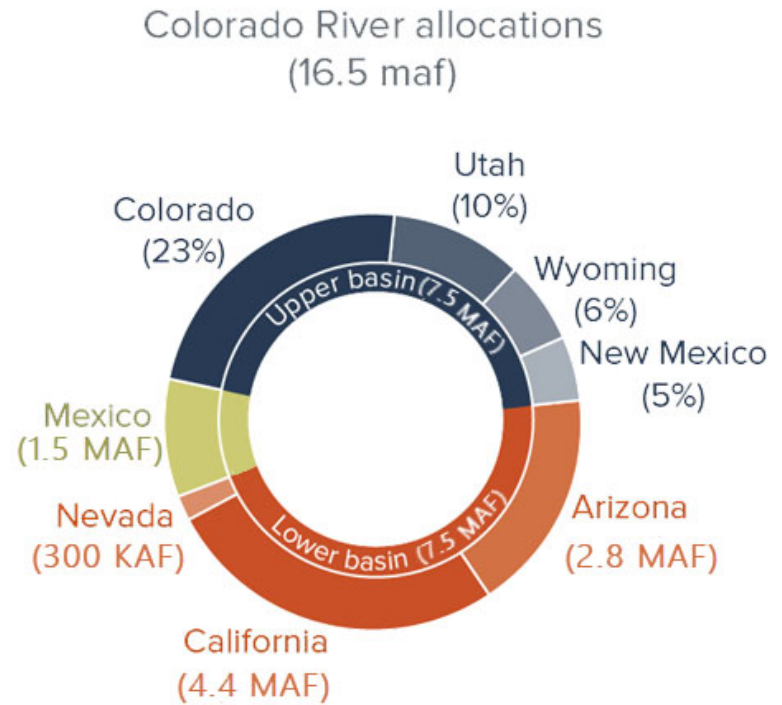

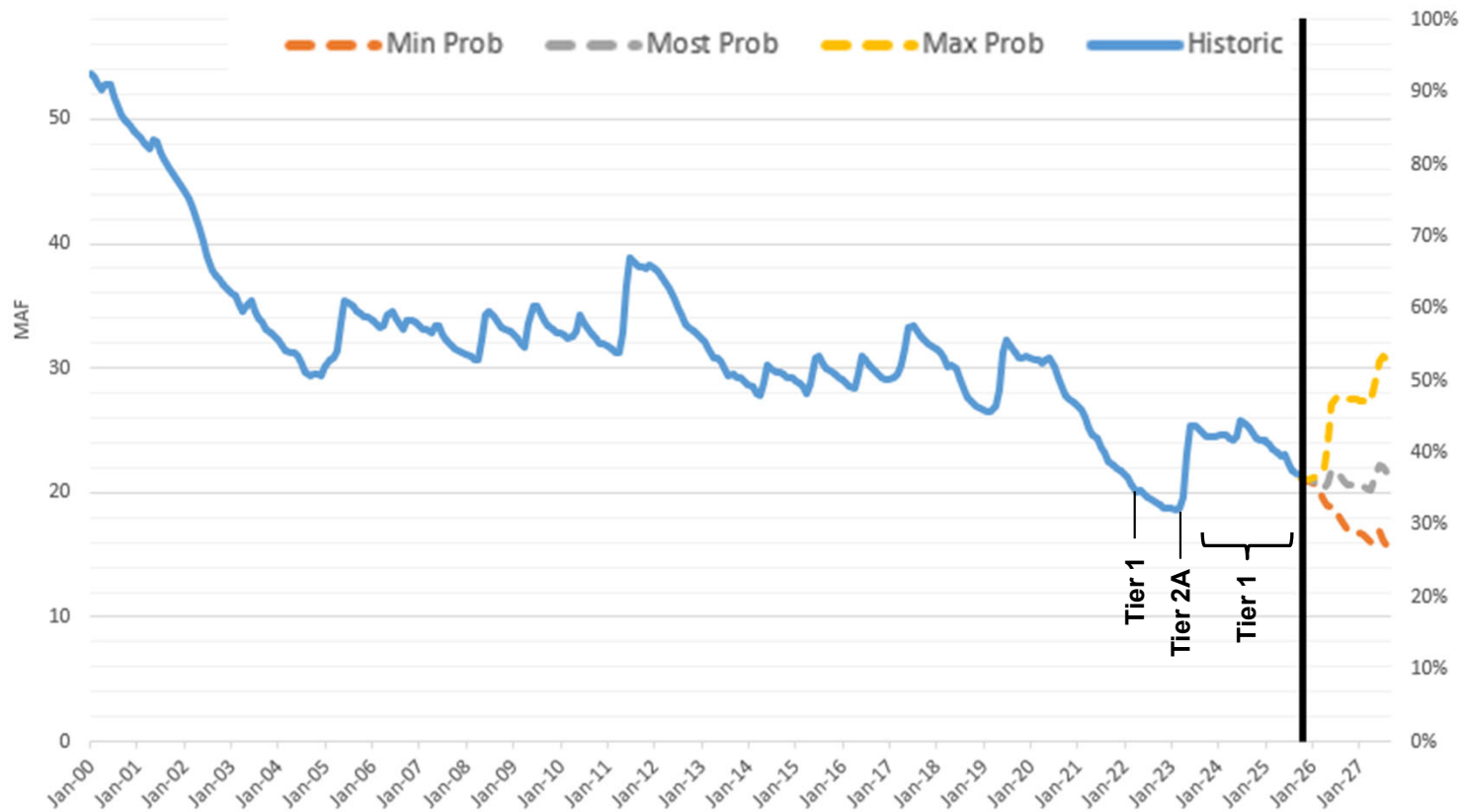

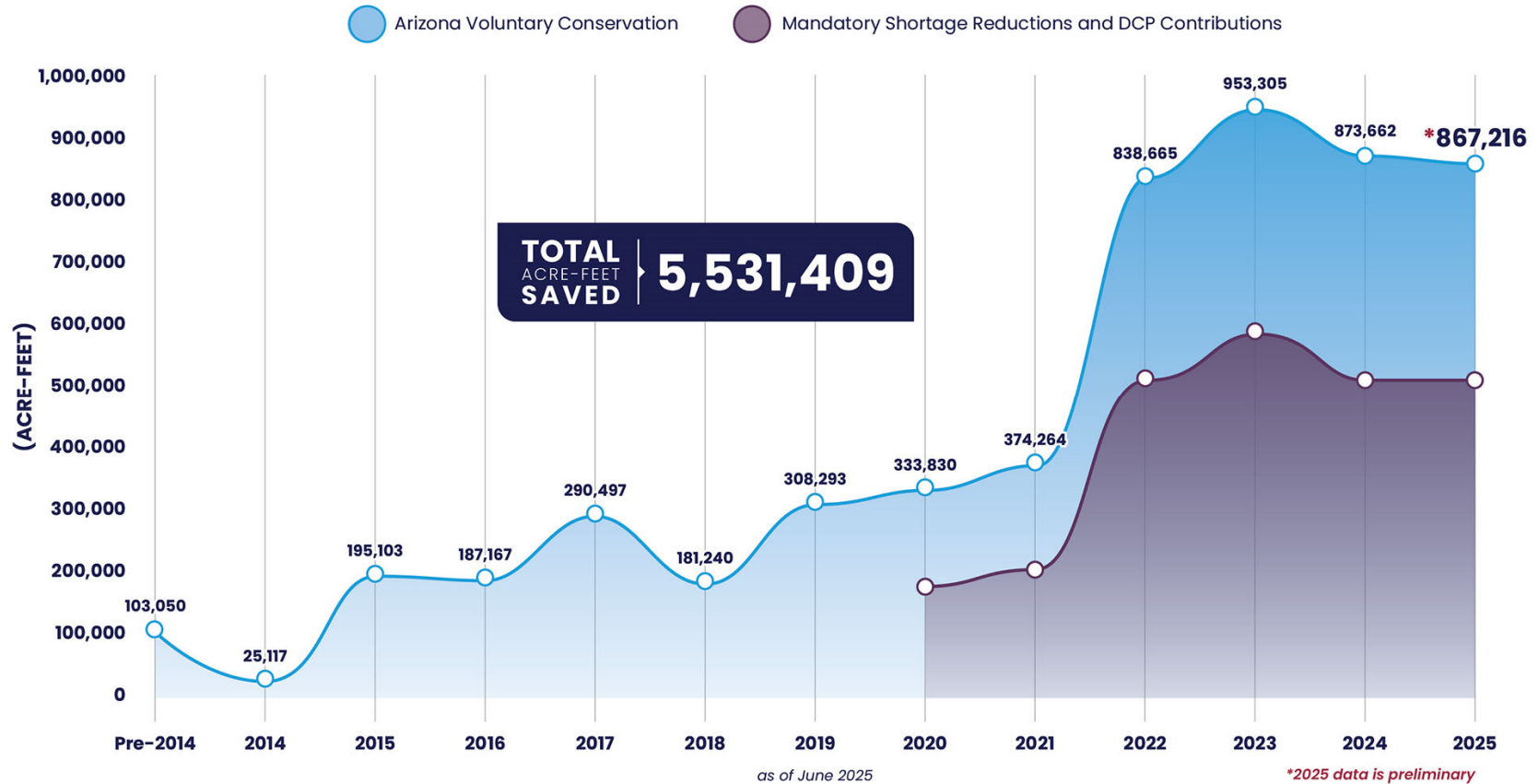
Stabilization efforts through 2026

Colorado River reservoir storage (MAF), observed (2000 – 2025) and projected (2026 - 2027)

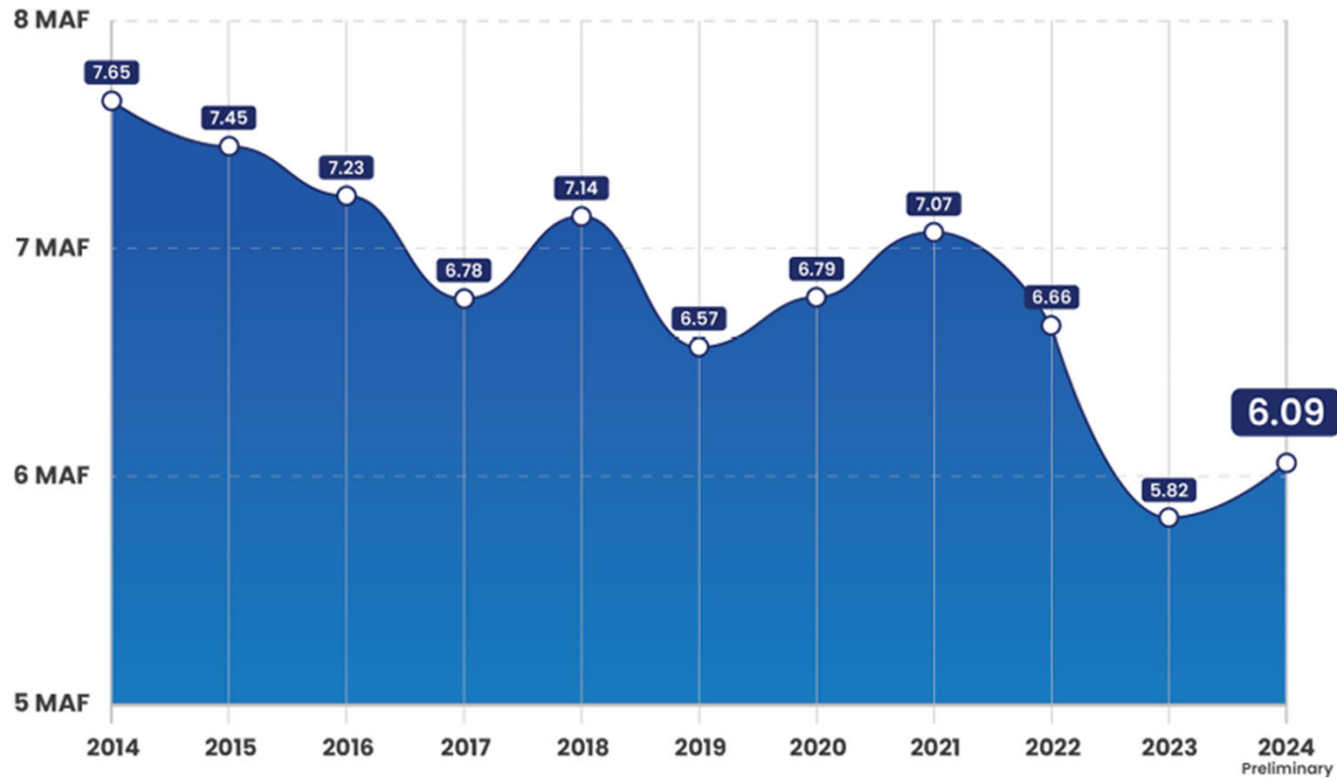


Arizona has actively conserved Colorado River water since before cuts were mandatory

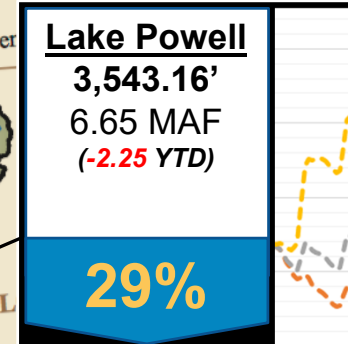
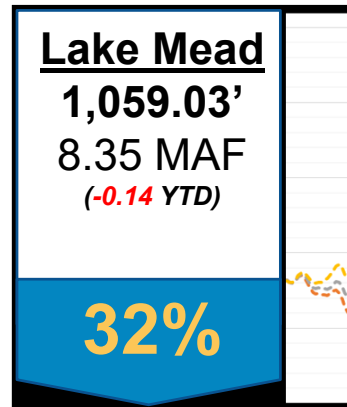

Where we're Going: The State of Post-2026 Negotiations

Negotiations behind schedule, parties committed to keep talking

November 12, 2025: Joint Statement, Seven Basin States and Interior/Reclamation:

“The seven Colorado River Basin states together with the Department of the Interior and the Bureau of Reclamation recognize the serious and ongoing challenges facing the Colorado River.

While more work needs to be done, collective progress has been made that warrants continued efforts to define and approve details for a finalized agreement.

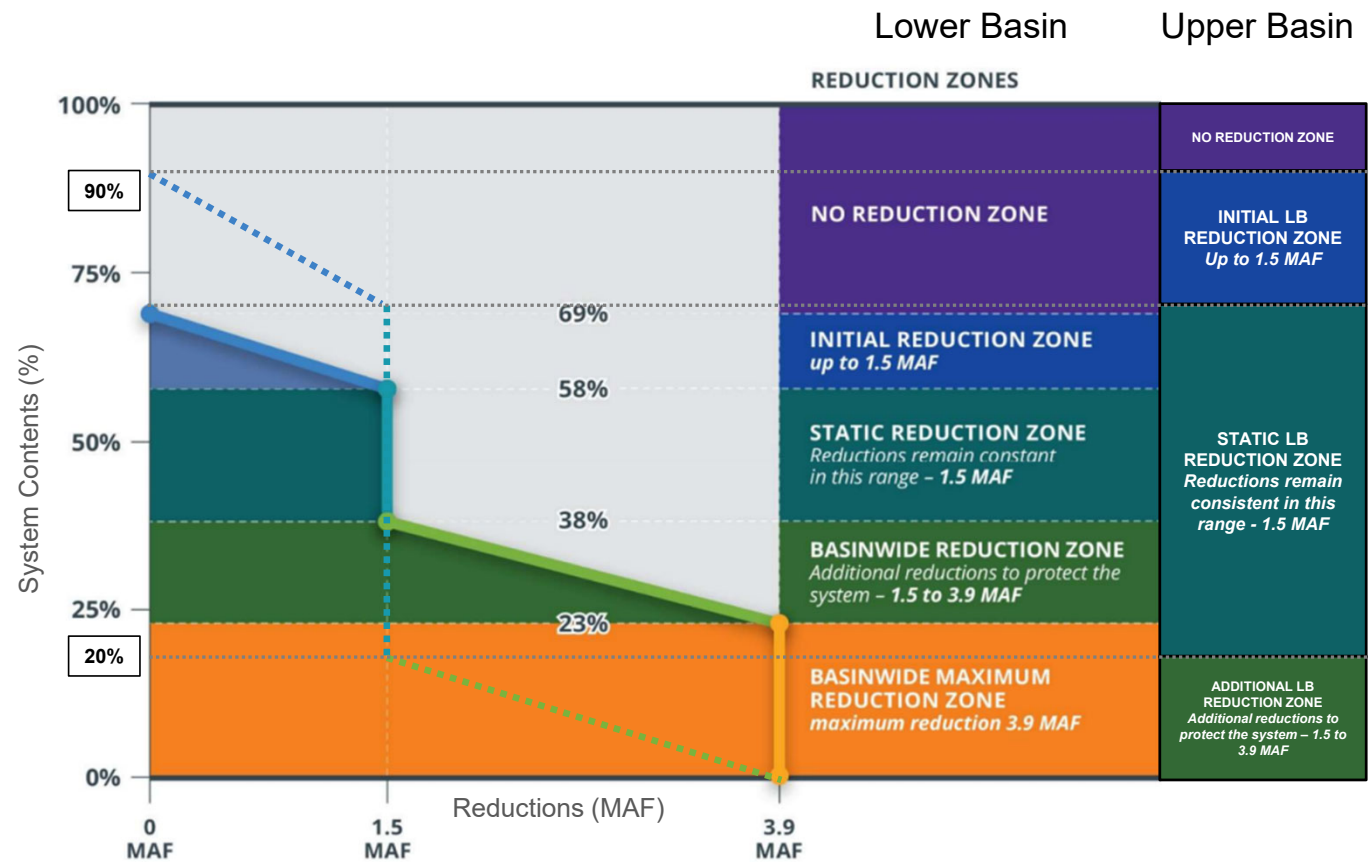


Post-2026: Proposed and Current Schedule



UB/LB Proposals Comparison on Reductions

- Lower Basin: start lower, total system contents, share reductions at lower %.
- Upper Basin: start higher (Powell/Mead) contents, reductions focused on Lower Basin.
