Marigold Energy Center Project Overview and Update

Using a PowerPoint presentation, Bill McClellan, SRP Director of Resource Planning, Acquisition and Development, stated that the purpose of the presentation was to provide information regarding additional development plans for the Marigold Energy Center located near Stanfield, Arizona.

B. McClellan provided an overview of the objectives and the capacity needs for Financial Plan 2027 (FP27). They noted that SRP's Integrated System Plan (ISP) system strategies guide the resource plan and focused on the following system strategies: energy investments, capacity investments, and partnerships and suppliers.

B. McClellan said that Fiscal Year 2025 (FY25) set a record for resource additions and reviewed the resources secured to serve the remaining need. They explained how the Marigold Energy Center contributes to FP27 capacity needs.

B. McClellan provided an aerial image, a project overview, and projected capital costs of the Marigold Energy Center. They concluded with a project timeline, public engagement phases overview, key takeaways, and next steps.

B. McClellan responded to questions from the Committee.

W. Fielder reviewed the remaining capacity needs for FP27 and provided a recap of the 2025 All-Source RFP timeline. They provided an overview of the following projects that were selected from the 2025 All-Source RFP: the Grande Verde project, the Lighthouse project, and the Turnbuckle Grid project.

W. Fielder presented a map identifying the selected projects' locations and said that the selected projects support capacity needs and contribute to SRP's 2035 sustainability goals.

They explained that tax credits for renewable projects are expiring and that SRP has an opportunity to expand three utility-scale solar projects previously selected from the 2024 All-Source RFP to take advantage of cost savings associated with the tax credits.

W. Fielder presented a map identifying the solar projects' locations and stated that SRP continues to add solar resources to meet system need and 2035 sustainability goals.

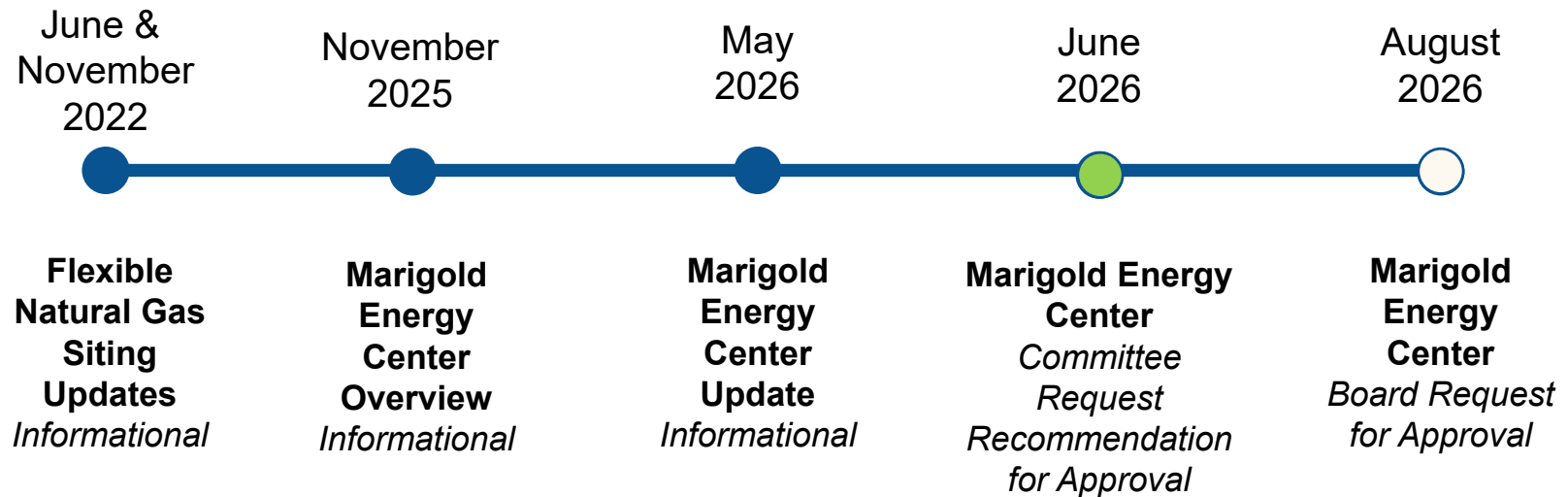

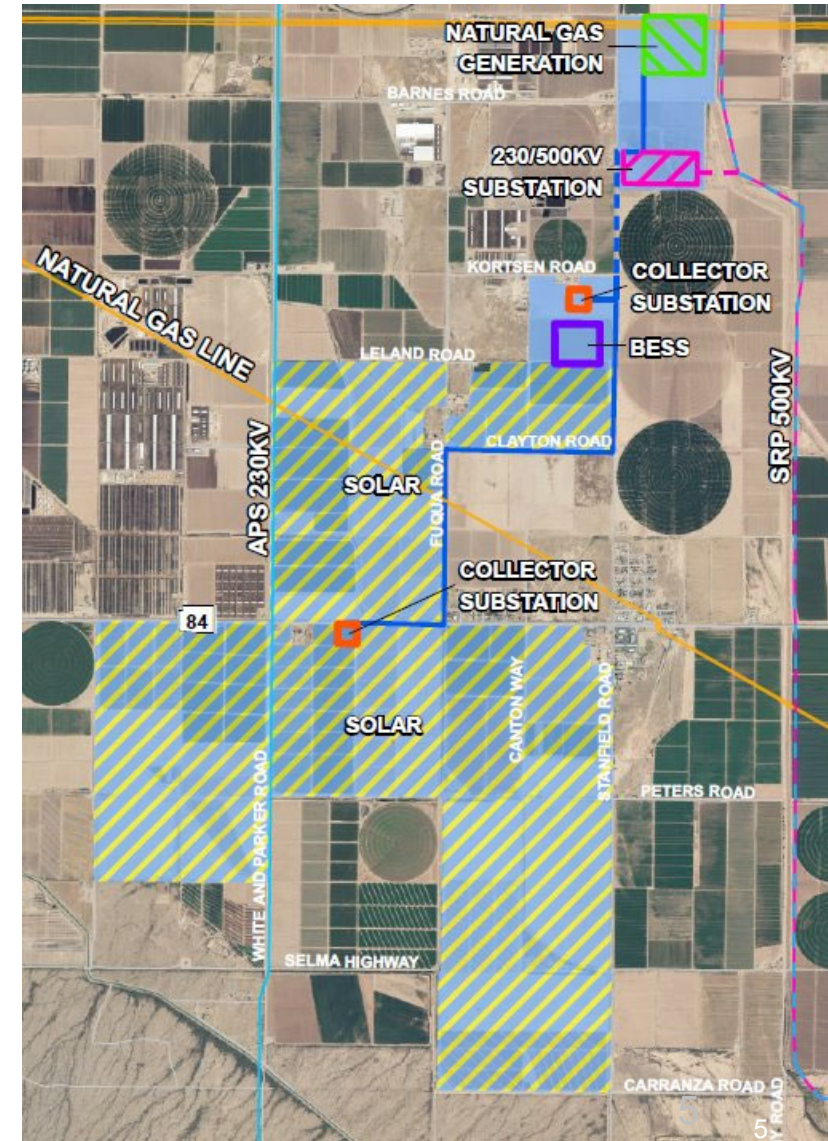

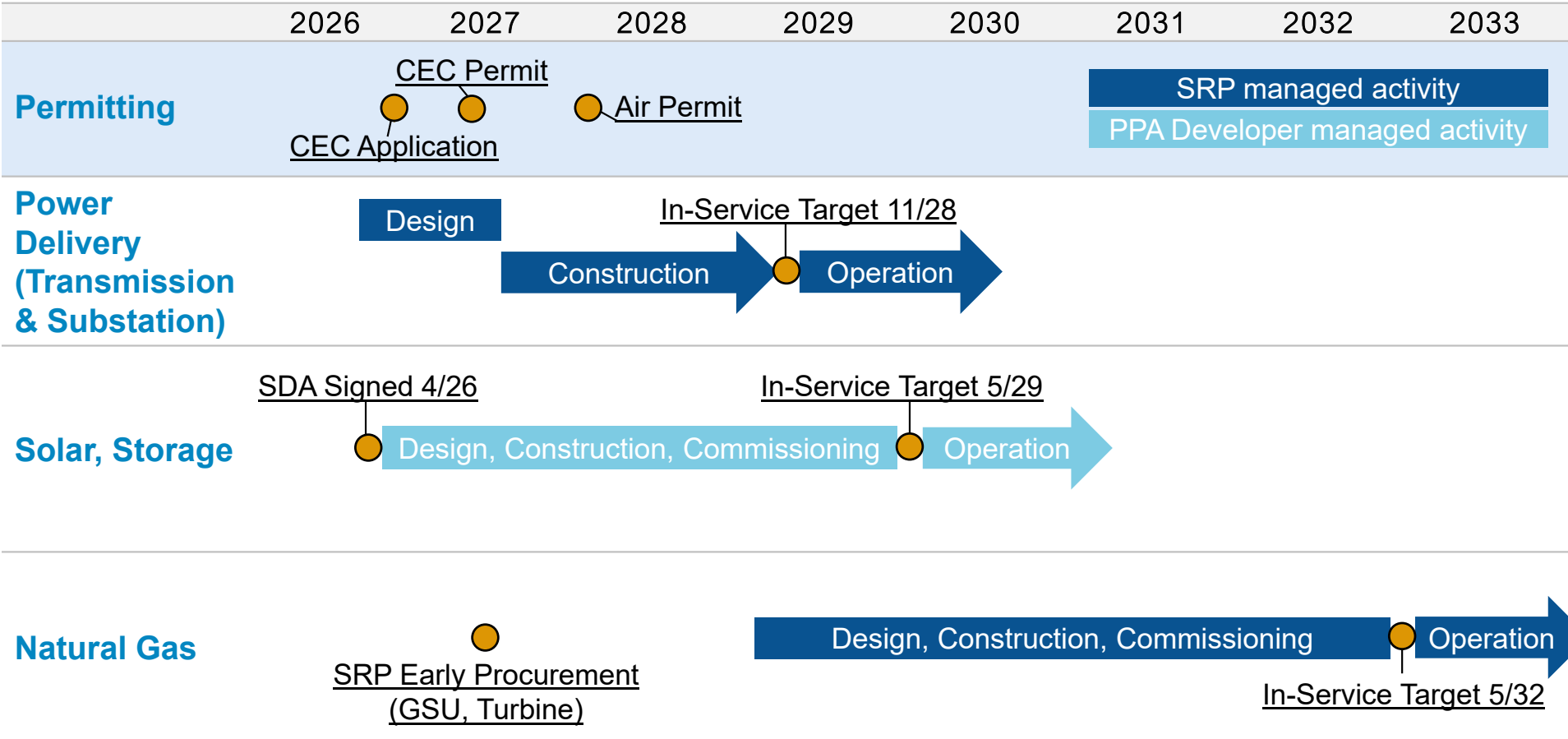

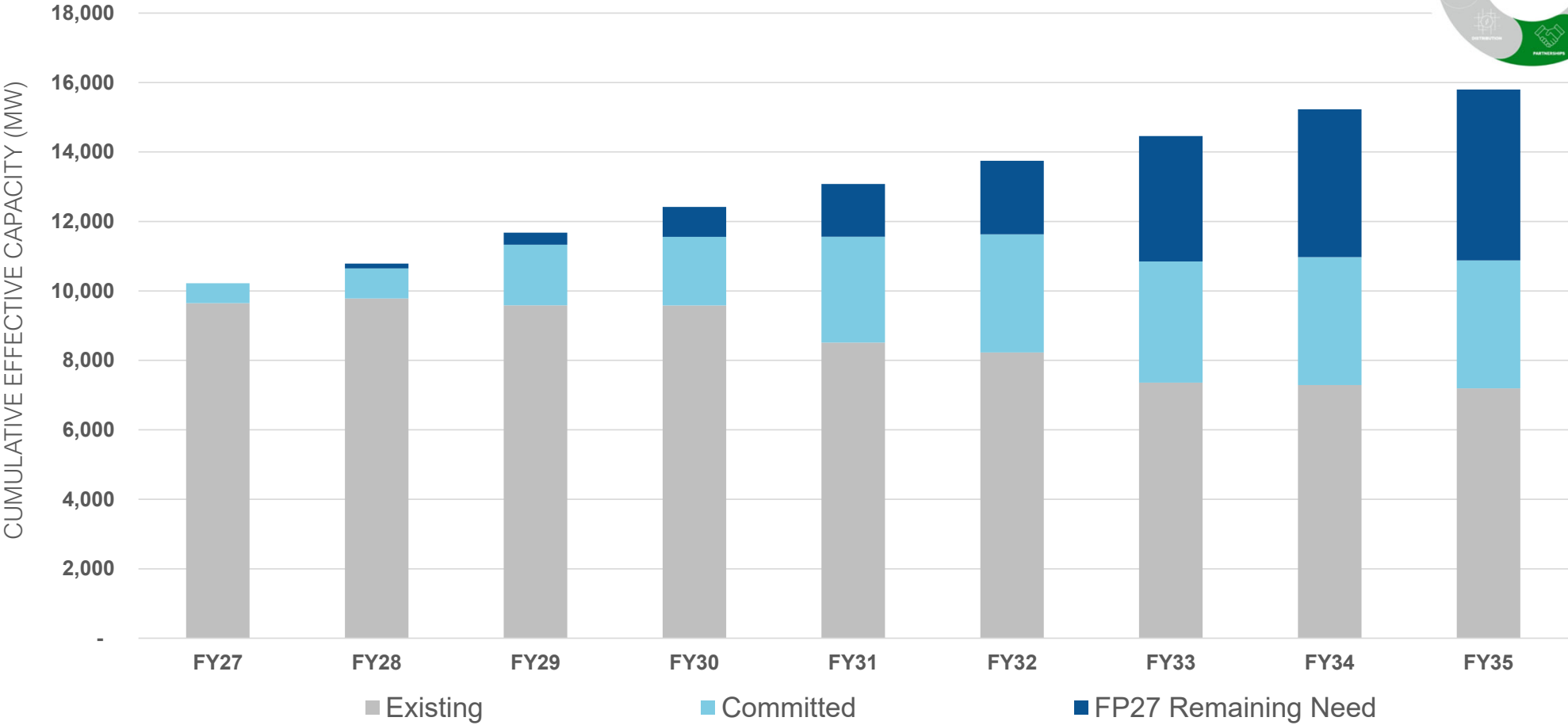

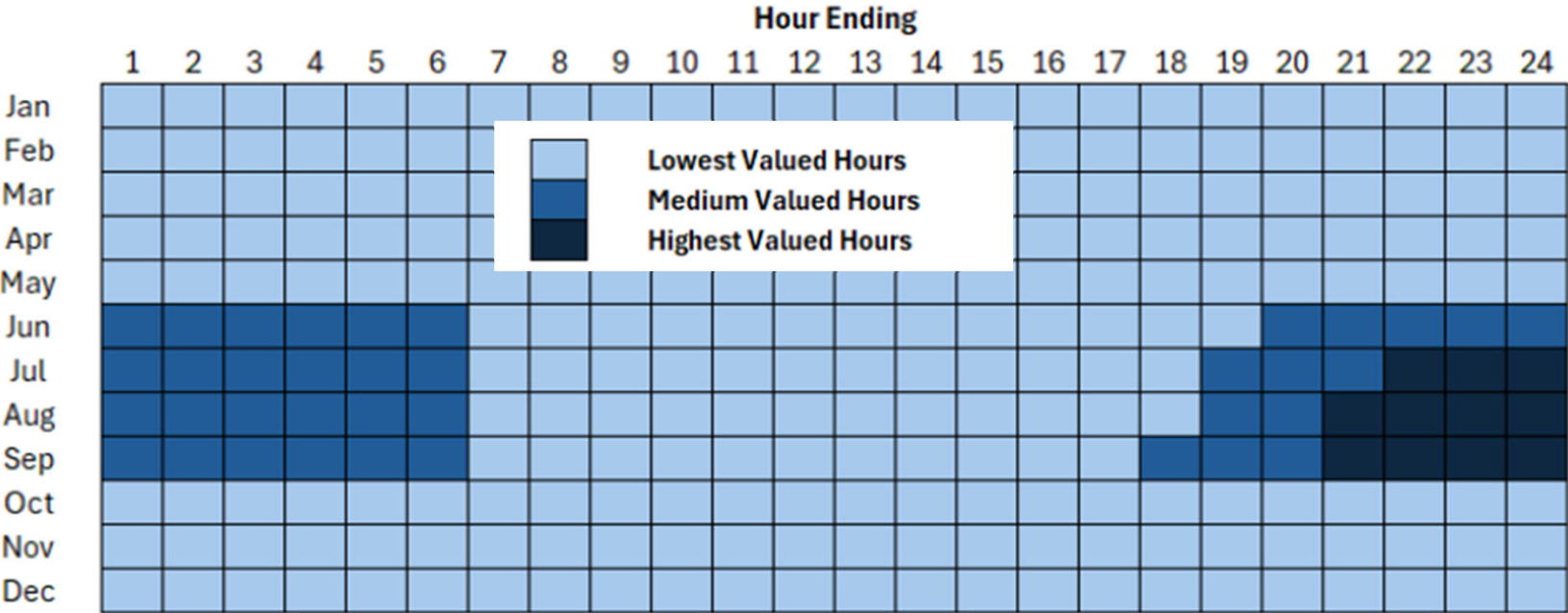

# Evolving Adequacy Need: Shifting Later and Lasting Longer

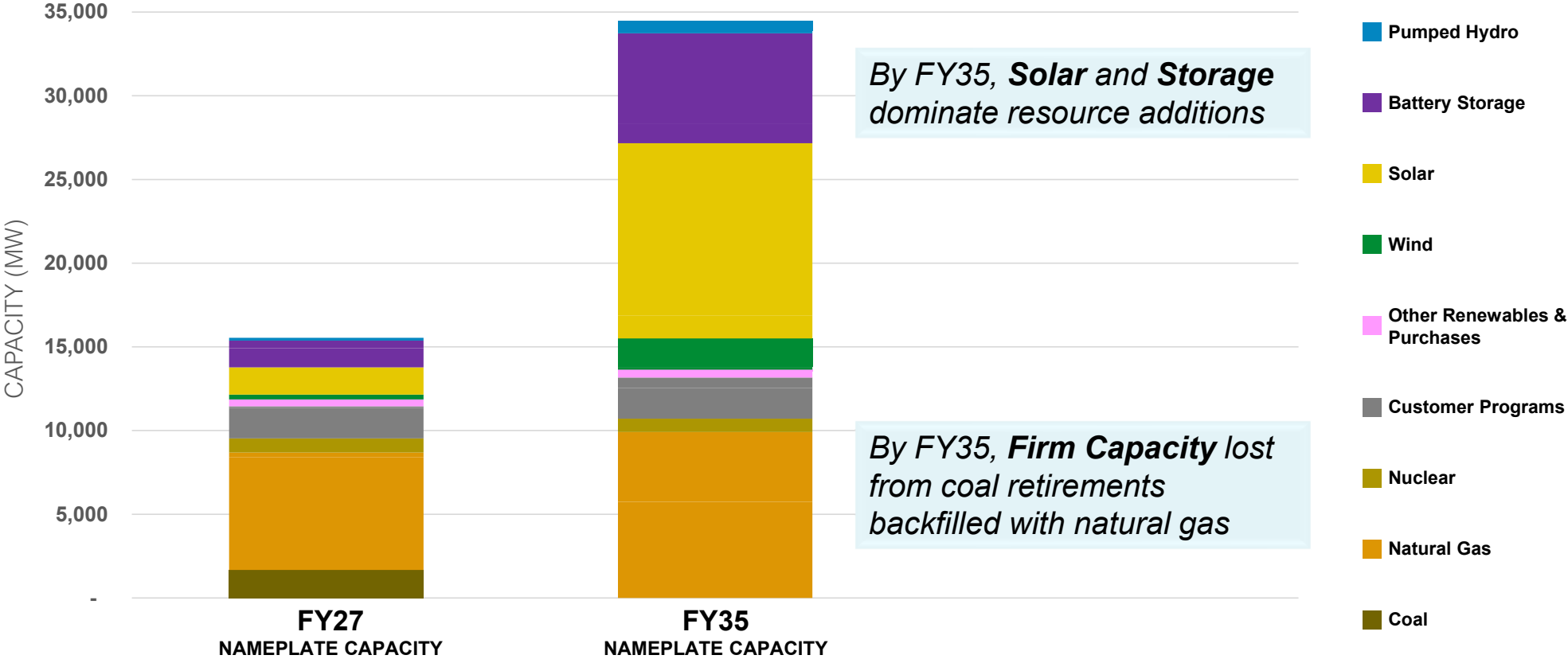

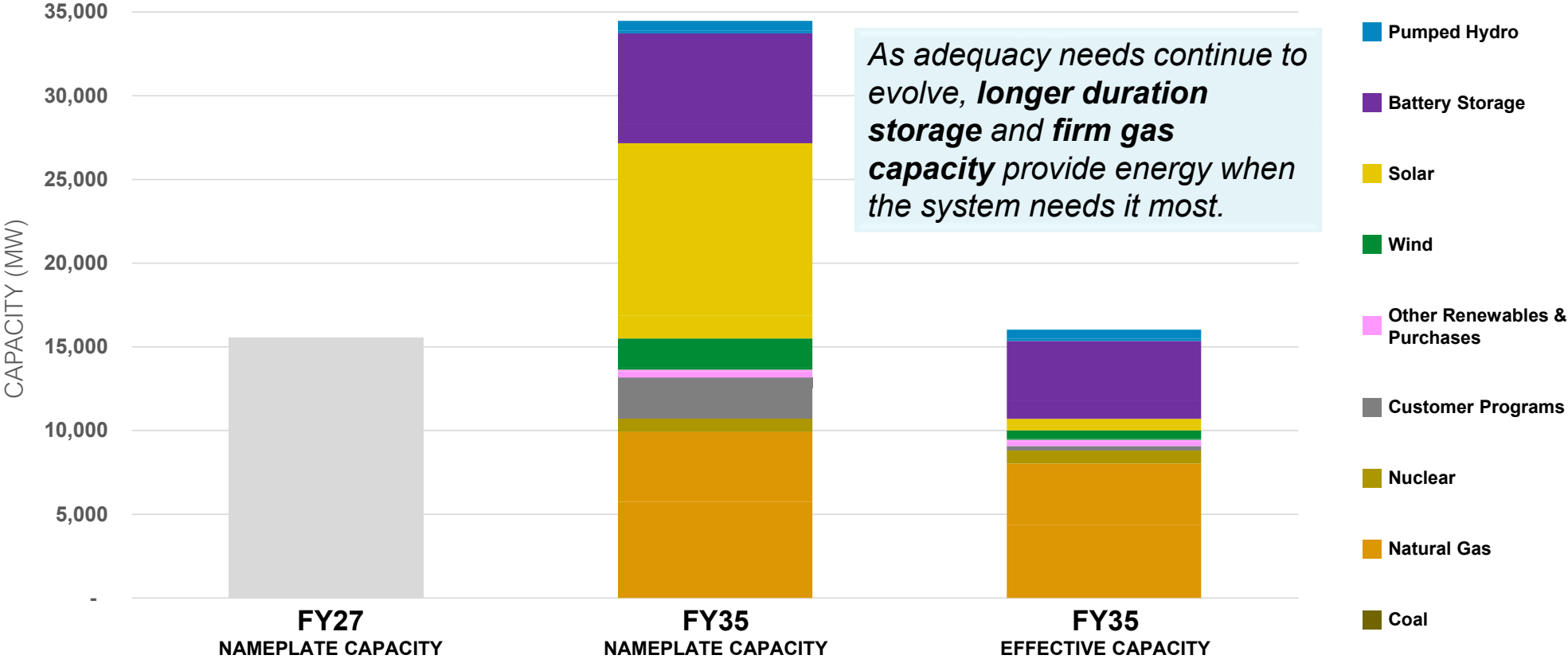
# Solar & Storage Lead Additions, Firm Capacity Ensures Reliability

## Nameplate Capacity Outlook (cost and feasibility lens)

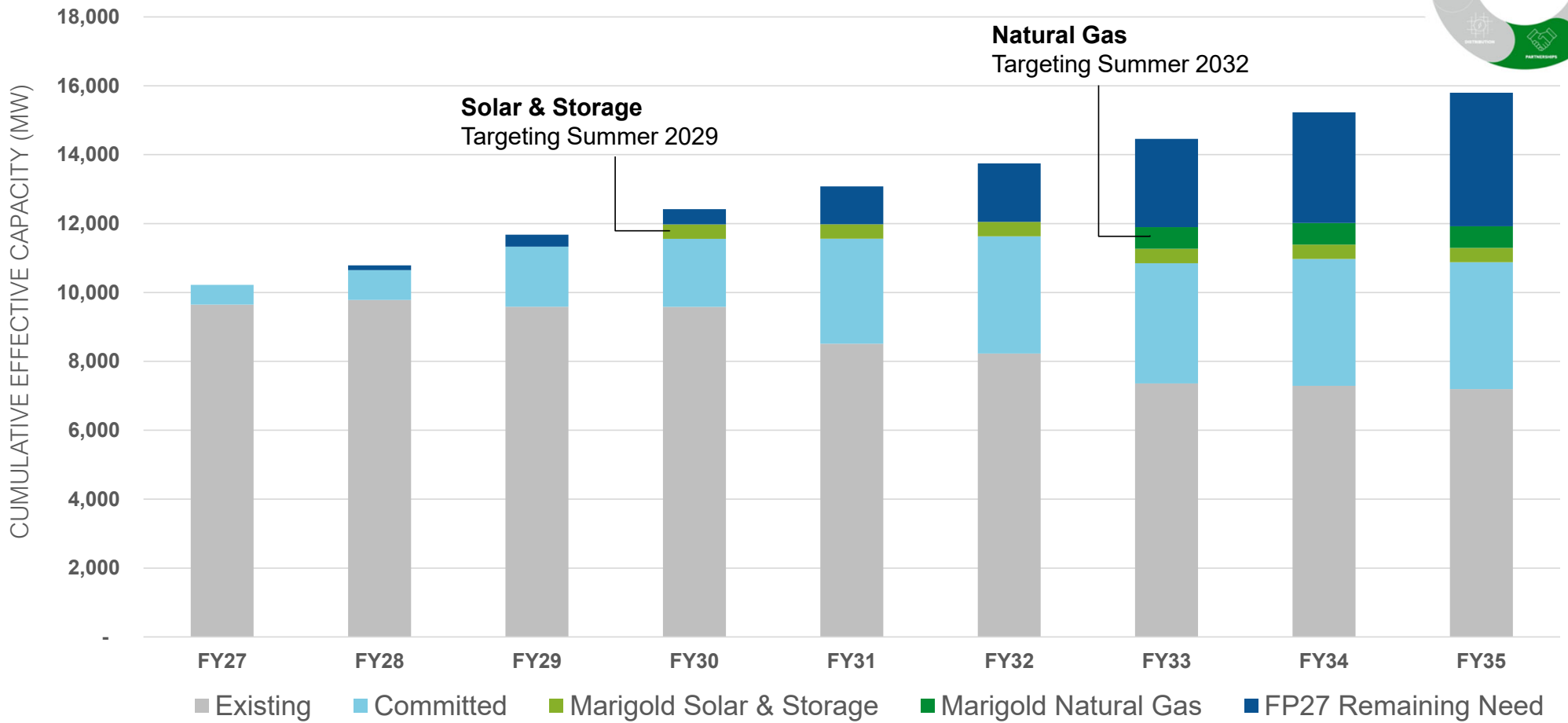

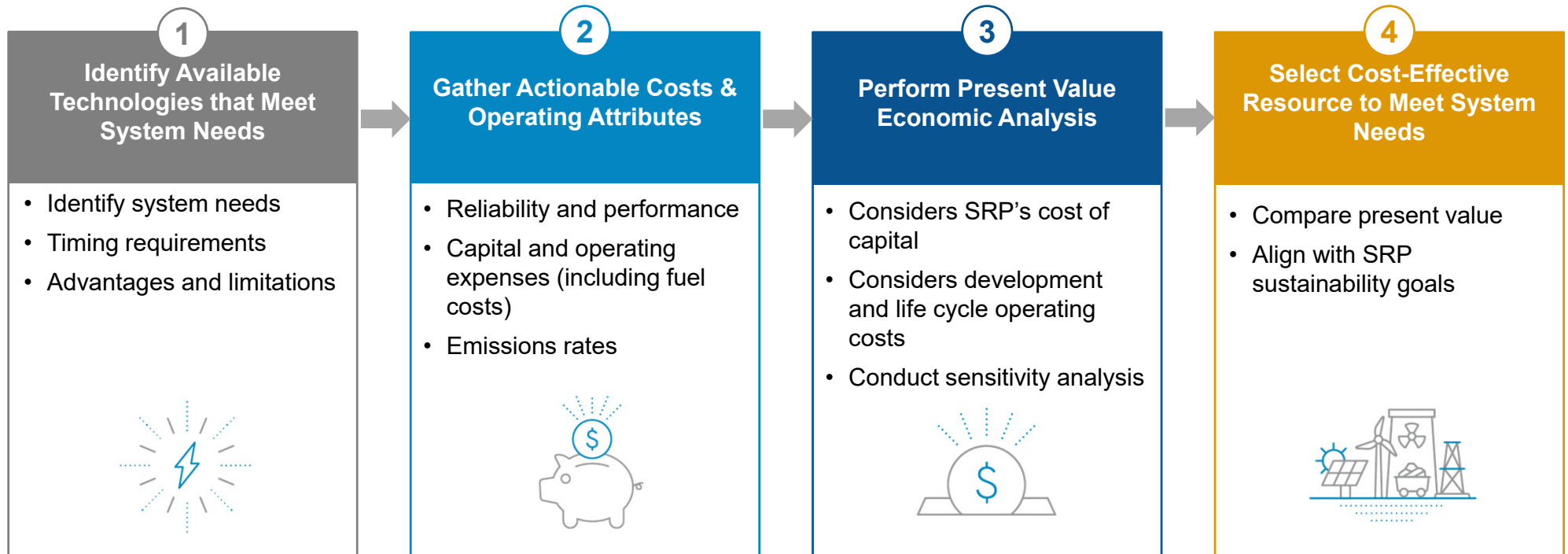
## Effective Capacity Outlook (reliability lens)








# Contribution to FP27 Capacity Needs

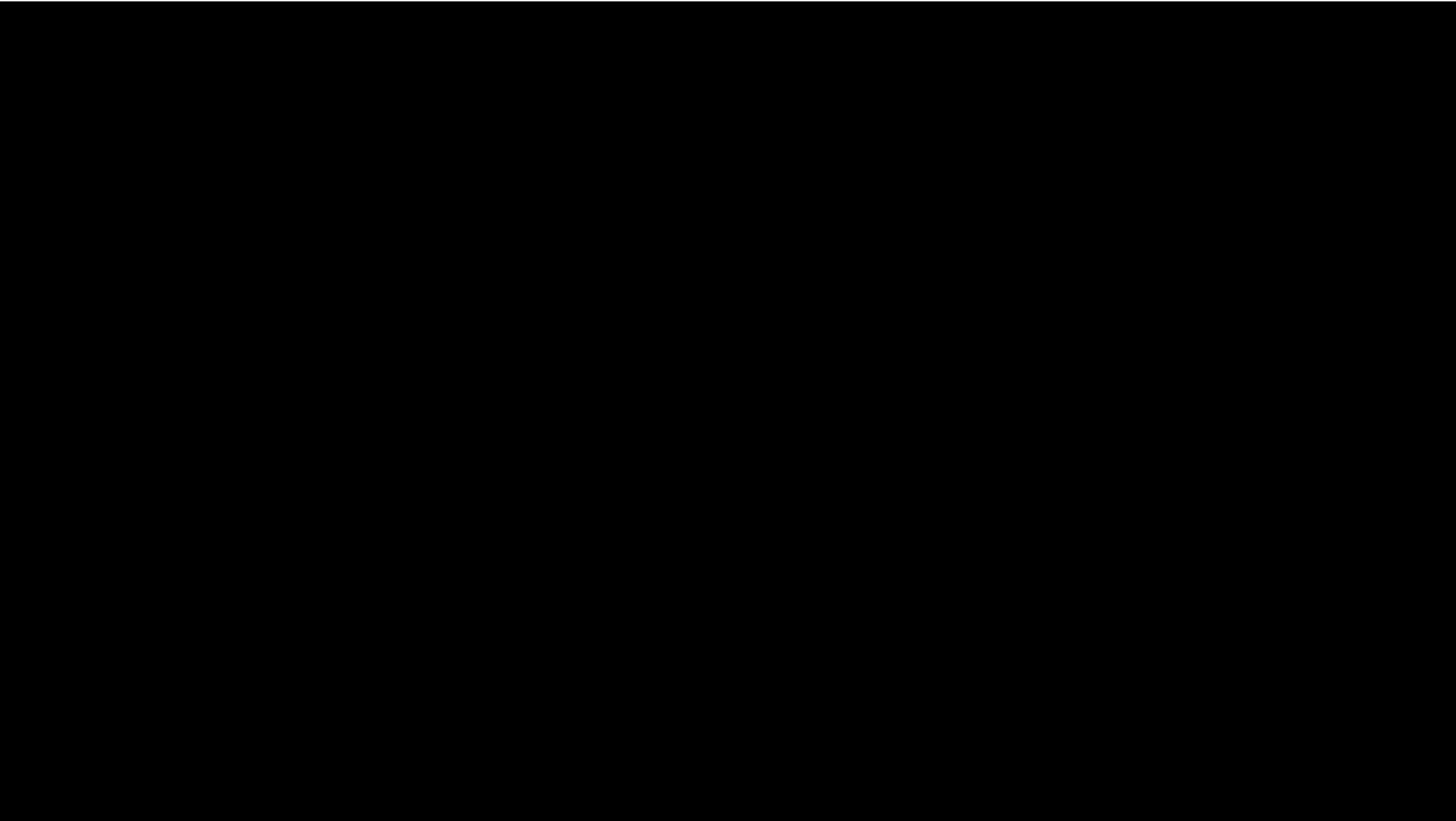

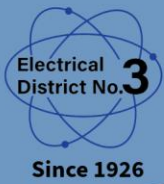
Dear Mr. Chris Dobson, President Salt River Project, and the members of SRP's Board of Directors,

On behalf of Electrical District No. 3 (ED3), I am pleased to express our strong support for the proposed Marigold Energy Center project and to acknowledge the value this project can provide to ED3's electric system, regional reliability, and the long-term energy and capacity needs of growing communities in Arizona.

As you may know, ED3 serves a rapidly expanding service territory and continues to experience increasing demand from residential, affordable multi-family developments, commercial, and small business customers. As we plan for future growth, we recognize the importance of maintaining a diversified resource portfolio that provides affordability, reliability, operational flexibility, and resilience. Our partnership with the SRP Marigold Energy Center project will help us meet current and future needs as the project scales in a meaningful way.

Since 2020, ED3's peak summer demand has grown by 40% to approximately 280 MW, driven largely by the sustained economic development and growth in the City of Maricopa. The Arizona Office of Economic Opportunity reports Pinal County grew by 3.7% between July 2024 and July 2025, the highest rate among the state's 15 counties. The City of Maricopa posted the largest population increase, adding 4,894 residents during the year. The estimate reflects a 6.7% increase, outpacing Arizona's statewide growth rate of 1.2%.

Over the past decade, the City's population has increased by 45% and assessed value by approximately 132%, reflecting in-migration and meaningful commercial development. The expansion of State Route 347 is a major project with a wide range of stakeholders that will meaningfully enhance connectivity and improve the attractiveness of residential and commercial investment. We view projects like the Marigold Energy Center as smart investments to meet community growth in a sustainable way.



In the last few years, as SRP has worked on its long-term resource strategy, ED3 has engaged with various teams across your organization on the Marigold Energy Center. The project represents a thoughtful approach to resource development by combining multiple technologies (solar, battery storage, natural gas capacity) that rely on Arizona's significant solar resources as its backbone while adding flexible capacity to maintain reliability. Participating in the Marigold Energy Center provides ED3 with the advantages of economies of scale that are only achievable through a larger regional project. The Marigold Energy Center is a key partnership initiative for ED3 to meet the needs of our local Pinal County service territory.

For ED3, projects such as Marigold can play an important role in supporting our evolving resource portfolio. As hydroelectric resources on the Colorado River become increasingly constrained by water availability and operational limitations, the ability for Marigold to replace or supplement our hydroelectric capacity and energy during critical peak periods is crucial.
